

LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

To the Residents of Benzie and Leelanau Counties.

The Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department Board of Health and Staff are pleased to present the 2002-2003 Annual Report. This "Annual Report" represents the period from January 1, 2002 through September 30, 2003. This report gives a snapshot of our agency's varied activities over the last 21 months and we hope you take the opportunity to review the information herein. The irregular time period reflects our department's change to an October 1-September 30 fiscal year, as of September 30, 2003.

Public Health agencies, including our district, have been presented with numerous communicable health challenges. West Nile Virus, SARS, and smallpox planning issues have taken much of our staff's time and effort during this period. Emergency Preparedness has been an ever-present theme of our health department. Through this timeframe it has become even clearer to us that cooperation with State, regional local public health, and other local agencies is critical in assuring the greatest level of protection for our two counties' residents.

The Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department, in the summer of 2003, was notified that we received Full Accreditation through the Michigan Local Public Health Department Accreditation Process. This process evaluates our administrative capacity, along with 18 public programs, based on a pre-determined standard of performance. Numerous programs were noted for their outstanding results and their innovative methods of exceeding the standards of performance.

I would like to thank the Board of Health members, community groups, and the two county Boards of Commission for their support over the last year. In addition, I especially want to thank the staff of the Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department for their positive approach to the very important work of ensuring the public's health in our region of the state.

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BENZIE-LEELANAU DISTRICT HEALTH DEPARTMENT 2002-2003 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department received full accreditation from the Michigan Local Public Health
 Accreditation Program in June of 2003. The notification indicates that the 18 programs/areas that were evaluated fully
 met the standards of the State of Michigan.
- Our agency was instrumental in obtaining a Regional Beach Water Sampling Grant from the Michigan DEQ in 2003.
 This grant provided for the sampling of seven major beaches in Benzie and Leelanau Counties. The results indicated that the water quality of our public beaches was very high.
- A regional collaboration of numerous human service, private medical, and public service organizations formed the
 Grand Traverse Regional Health Care Coalition in 2003. This Coalition's purpose is to provide to low income (nonMedicaid) residents of Leelanau, Benzie and Grand Traverse Counties primary care insurance and basic prescription
 drug coverage. Our Department has representation on the GTRHCC Board of Directors.
- In the summer of 2003, the Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department was a lead agency in forming the Leelanau County Tobacco Task Force. The task force focuses on preventing youth smoking, promoting smoking cessation, and reducing secondhand smoke in Leelanau County.
- In 2002, our agency was the #1 health department in the State of Michigan for promoting breastfeeding duration.

 Additionally, we were the WC Silver Medal Winner for exceeding our projected WIC Caseload.
- The Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department received an award from the Michigan Department of Community Health for improving our immunization rates by more than 10% from January 2002 to May 2003. Currently, 74% of children 19-36 months of age in Benzie and Leelanau Counties are up-to-date with the required immunizations.

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BIOTERRORISM AND EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

In response to the increased threat of biological terrorism, the Centers for Disease Control provided funding to local health departments to enhance our ability to effectively respond to biological and other small and large scale emergencies. A Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coordinator was hired, with the primary duties of developing emergency response procedures and plans, and training health department staff to implement these plans.

Collaboration with regional and county emergency response partners

For emergency response purposes, Benzie and Leelanau County are located in Michigan's 7th District, which covers 19 counties in northern lower Michigan. Collaboration among local, regional, and state emergency response partners is vital to ensure an effective, coordinated response to a large scale disaster. Benzie-Leelanau District Health Department staff actively participate in numerous local and regional workgroups with the goal of creating a multi-disciplinary, integrated emergency response plan.

Smallpox response planning


In late 2002, amidst national unrest and concerns about the U.S. vulnerability to weaponized smallpox virus, public health was directed to form teams of public health and hospital workers who could quickly and effectively respond to an outbreak of smallpox disease. Michigan's Region 7, which includes Benzie and Leelanau County, was among the first in the country to begin vaccinating public health and health care smallpox response teams. Furthermore, Region 7 has more vaccinated smallpox response team members per capita than any other region in the state of Michigan.


• Enhanced Surveillance and Detection
