Teamwork makes the dream work! Creating things together builds problem-solving, language, early math & science skills, & social skills. Plus, it can be fun! See what you & your child can build together using different materials found around the house such as cardboard, sticks, cans, or anything you can imagine!





Family fun day! What does your family like to do together? What makes your family unique? Share favorite stories with your child & celebrate what makes your family great!



Playing with your food is okay! Exploring different kinds of foods with all your senses helps children learn how to try new things, understand their body's senses, and builds vocabulary! What color is this strawberry? What does it feel like in my hand? Is it soft, wet, squishy...? Does it make a sound when I bite it? How does it smell? What can I taste?



Open-ended art projects with a variety of materials lets your child explore their creativity, plan & problem-solve, & develop fine motor skills. Art can be messy with young children, but it is more about the process than the final product!
